
"Affektive Entgleisungen. Queerer Vandalismus in Grimmelshausens Courasche"

Alrick Daldrup Christian-Albrechts-University Kiel, Germany

The German Quarterly's 2023 award for the best paper written by a graduate student goes to **Alrik Daldrup**, who is currently completing his MA in German literature and political science at the Christian-Albrechts-Universität zu Kiel. He receives the award for his paper "Affektive Entgleisungen. Queerer

Vandalismus in Grimmelshausens Courasche." In the essay, Daldrup analyzes Courasche as a queer figure of transgression who deviates from prescribed gender and sexual roles and defies the social norms of her era. Drawing on queer affect theory, Daldrup reframes Courasche as a willful subject, tracing her refusal of dominant expectations through her ugly feelings and her queer orientation toward spaces and objects. His persuasive close readings of Courasche's agency and of the narrative deviations and epistemic subversions of Grimmelshausen's 1670 novel unlock the queer potential of this premodern text while also demonstrating its relevance to contemporary debates about precarity, migration, war, and intersecting regimes of discrimination. Daldrup's writing is lively and erudite, and his incisive analysis offers a compelling reconsideration of a contested classic.

"Tesla in Grünheide: Growing Intercultural Competence Through Role-Play Simulation"

Hyoun-A Joo & Lina Tuschling

Georgia Institute of Technology & Middle Georgia State University, Atlanta, Georgia

Hyoun-A Joo (Ph.D., The Pennsylvania State University) is an Assistant Professor of German at Georgia Institute of Technology in Atlanta, Georgia. Her research interests include second language acquisition, sociolinguistics, and intercultural

pragmatics at the intersection of migration and identity. She is also interested in pedagogical methods to develop intercultural competence in the classroom. Her current research focuses on immigrants' acquisition of syntactic structures and realizations of speech acts.

Lina Tuschling (Ph.D., Kennesaw State University) is a Research Associate at TRENDS Global in Atlanta, Georgia, and she also teaches at Middle Georgia State University. Her research interests include Social Identity, post-conflict peacebuilding, and refugee resettlement. She is also interested in experiential teaching and simulation design, particularly for the purpose of teaching conflict management, complex peace-building, and community resilience.

Congratulations to Dr. Hyoun-A Joo and Dr. Lina Tuschling on their exceptional article, "Tesla in Grünheide: Growing Intercultural Competence Through Role-Play Simulation," chosen as this year's Best Article by the *Die Unterrichtspraxis / Teaching German* editorial board. The authors' work in foreign language education, particularly in the realm of intercultural communicative competence (ICC), stands out for its quality and innovation. The simulation exercise, inspired by the real-world challenges surrounding the Tesla Gigafactory in Grünheide, Germany, demonstrates their pedagogical prowess. Placing students in the heart of a genuine controversy, this immersive town hall meeting scenario compels students to engage with complex issues and diverse perspectives. The exercise, tailored for advanced-level German students within a virtual study abroad program, has yielded impressive results. Students have expanded their knowledge and refined critical ICC skills essential for navigating today's globalized world. Dr. Joo and Dr. Tuschling's article is not merely academically significant; it's a pedagogical masterpiece. Their meticulous lesson planning, contemporary relevance, and extensive appendix of materials exemplify their dedication to nurturing critical thinking and intercultural competence. This work provides a valuable model for language educators preparing students for the multifaceted challenges of the modern era.



Max Kade Prize for Best Article in The German Quarterly



"Alloyed Truth: The Historiographical and Political Importance of Error in Ludwig Börne's Journalism"

Michael Swellander Skidmore College, Saratoga Springs, New York

Michael Swellander (Ph.D., Germanic Languages, Columbia University), currently Visiting Assistant Professor of German at Skidmore College, receives the Max Kade Prize for the best article published in The German Quarterly in 2022 (issue no. 95.3). His article, "Alloyed Truth: The Historiographical and Political Importance of Error in Ludwig Börne's Journalism," offers a timely and provocative reflection on the positive role of error in Börne's journalistic writings. His analysis of texts from Börne's journal Die Wage highlights three areas in which error is central to Börne's thought: historiography, errata, and public discourse. In each case, through a deft combination of close reading and historical contextualization, Swellander demonstrates the ephemeral and momentary energy of error as well as its political edge. For Börne, error is a critical tool that can challenge the censor, undermine hidden authoritarian agendas, and reveal personal prejudice, ultimately serving as a catalyst for truth. Well-researched and engagingly written, this outstanding article compellingly demonstrates the surprising role of error in Börne as well as the Vormärz more broadly.

Bridget is currently an Assistant Professor in the Department of German & Russian and Film & Television Studies at the University of Vermont. Bridget embodies the achievements recognized by this award. She is an inspiring scholar, an exemplary teacher, a textbook author, and workshop facilitator and presenter, and a promoter of German Studies in the United States.



Bridget's research interests and publications include work on German Film Studies, Adaptation Studies, Contemporary European Cinema, Media Literacy, Foreign Language Pedagogy and Curricular Design, German Language Instruction (all levels), German Literary History, and World Film History. Bridget co-authored a widely used textbook, *Augenblicke: German through Film, Media & Texts*, that includes a fully integrated online platform and ancillary materials and is published by the American Association of Teachers of German. Her monograph, *Adapting German Canonical Literature: Contested Nationhood in Twenty-First-Century Film* is forthcoming with Palgrave Macmillan in 2024. With 12 invited presentations and over 35 conference presentations, Bridget is an active member of the profession. Her work as educational consultant and teacher training coach with both the AATG and the Goethe-Institut is widely recognized and contributes to the vibrancy and innovation that mark German Studies in the 21st century.

Heidi reaches her students by being an innovative educator who engages her students in a variety of ways. One of her students shared the following: "German class is different. Mr. Lechner has a method of teaching that is as unique as it is effective. Ms. Lechner teaches material not through lectures and worksheets, but through collaborative activities, games, and experiential lessons. When she taught us about the brothers Grimm, we made little models out of paper and gummi bears, we watched animated videos, and zoomed with a native speaker to discuss the fairytales. At the end of the unit, I didn't have a notebook full of scribbled German, but I did understand the significance of the Brothers Grimm fairytale in the German culture."
