

CALIFORNIA GENERAL ELECTION UPDATE

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Although Donald Trump won the presidency and Republicans took control of the U.S. Senate, California is on track to remaining solidly blue after yesterday's General Election. Votes are still being tallied and many races are too close to call, but Kamala Harris won the state, as expected. Despite Harris winning California, if current percentages hold (Harris 57.4%/Trump 40%), her margin will be lower than Biden's victory in California against Trump four years ago (Biden 63.5%/Trump 29.2%). In the U.S. Senate race, Adam Schiff (D) easily defeated Steve Garvey (R) to succeed former U.S. Senator Dianne Feinstein, which was not a surprise. Early Democratic turnout is higher than it was in 2022, and with several close house races in play, California will be key in deciding whether Republicans retain control of the U.S. House of Representatives.

Down the ticket, Democrats will retain their supermajorities in both the Senate and Assembly. The question that still remains is by what margin. There are several seats where Democrats are leading against vulnerable incumbent Republicans that likely won't be called for several days or weeks. All-told, 36 new legislators will be sworn in next month, making this the largest freshman class in ten years.


Voters were asked to decide the fate of ten ballot measures this year, ranging from rent control and involuntary servitude to Medi-Cal funding and criminal enhancements. Prop 36, which will increase penalties for repeated theft offenses and certain drug crimes, was easily approved despite a package of bills passed by the Legislature this year aiming to address the state's rising retail theft problem. Conversely, Prop 33, which would have expanded local rent control protections, was rejected by voters.

With a Trump victory, California will once again attempt to "Trump proof" itself. Rumors of a potential special legislation to contemplate this are already circulating, as well as whispers of Kamala Harris running for Governor in 2026. The last time Trump was in office, California fought his administration on issues such as reproductive freedom, environmental protections and immigration. We can expect a repeat of this over the next four years.

Below are preliminary results from some of the noteworthy races and ballot measures. Note that California law allows any vote postmarked on election day to be counted as long as it is received by Friday. Many of the results in these races could change in the coming days and weeks as results are finalized.
