* 2023-24 President John Paquette is the only all-time CSC board member from the Big East Conference.

* Three of the four current members of the Officer's Rotation also previously served on the Board:

* Mary Beth Challoner of Toronto is just the second Board member from a Canadian school and the first female from a Canadian school to serve on the Board. (Jack Neumann of Calgary, 1989-92). She is also the first person from a Canadian school to serve in the Officer's rotation.

Important Dates in Pre-CSC History

Before CSC

Prior to the College Sports Information Directors of America (CoSIDA) forming in 1957, there was a more than 20-year history of collegiate athletic media relations professionals working in conjunction with the American College Public Relations Association.

From 1931 to 1955 several different individuals served as vice president of the Sports Section of the American College Public Relations Association. The primary duty of these vice presidents at the time was to call together sports section representatives at the annual January meeting. But these individuals saw the need for an independent organization for the young but flourishing profession.

Below is a list of those individuals who served as vice chairs of the ACPRA, who in turn were the chairpersons of the sports section.

Historical Dates

1952 • The very first Academic All-America® team is selected. This team became the forerunner to the present CoSIDA Academic All-America® team. Lester Jordan, the then sports information director at SMU, is considered the father of the first team, which was released on Saturday, December 6, 1952.

1953-54 • James Coogan of Penn State is elected the first president of a group of sports publicists who were all members of the American College Public Relations Association.

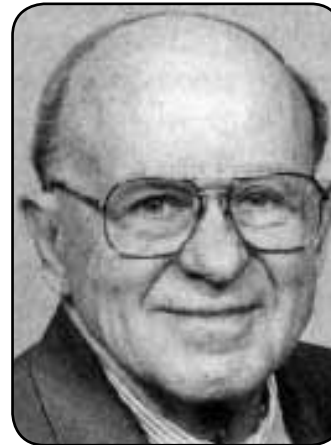
1954-55 • The ACPRA sports section representatives elect an executive committee including steering committee chairman, Wiles Hallock of Wyoming.

1955-56 • Two conventions were held - one in January and one in August in Chicago. At the Sports Division Convention in August, 73 SIDs attended, including Marjorie Sussman of Washington University of St. Louis who became the first woman SID to attend a convention. Wiles Hallock of Wyoming is a unanimous choice to serve as President of Sports Division of ACPRA.

Important Dates in CSC History

The Organization is formed in 1957

The following is a 67-year chronological history of the organization from its official formation in 1957.

1957-58 • The organization begins to take on new identity of sports information publicists. No longer are members of the organization linked to the ACPRA. Glenn L. "Ted" Mann of Duke University is named the first President of the new organization known as CoSIDA. John Cox of the United States Naval Academy, who was in his second term as secretary-treasurer, was also appointed the organization's News Digest editor. The first vice president was also the program chairman for the following year. Fred Stabley, Michigan State, was the first to hold both titles. Two major awards are established - Arch Ward Award to recognize outstanding members of the profession, and the Jake Wade Award for those in media who make great contributions to college athletics.



1960-61 • Small college representatives named to the executive committee for the first time. Initial members were Charlie Ray, North Carolina College, and Ernie Goodman, Howard. All past presidents of the organization are now executive board members.

1961-62 • John Cox resigns in February, 1962, thus forcing the split in duties between secretary-treasurer and Bob Culp, Western Michigan, who replaces Cox on the board, becomes the Digest editor.

1963 • Basketball becomes the second sport in which CoSIDA is selecting Academic All-Americans.

1965 • At the NAIA Convention in Kansas City in March, small college SIDs formed an organization entitled NAIA-SIDA with Dr. W.J. Bell of East Texas State as its first president.

1969-70 • Three vice presidential positions established with new responsibilities defined. Pete McCarthy of Brown, second vice president the year before, resigns and Scoop Hudgins of the Southeastern Conference, moves up from third vice president post. President Harry Burrell of Iowa State, petitions the Directors to select Dick Page of Massachusetts, as replacement for second vice president Frank Walter of Army, who resigned in November, 1969. CoSIDA Hall of Fame is

instituted in 1969 with an initial induction class of 39 members.

1970 • The first Academic All-America baseball team is selected

1972 • First workshop held outside of Chicago. The 1972 Workshop was held in New Orleans after 15 years in Chicago.

1977-78 • Dave Wohlhueter of Cornell becomes CoSIDA Treasurer. He will hold the position for the next 35 years.

1979-80 • Rosa Gatti of Brown enters the officer rotation as the first female member to do so. She also becomes the first female member of the board.

1979-80 • Fred Nuesch of Texas A&M-Kingsville becomes CoSIDA Secretary and he will serve in that role for the next 23 years.

1980 • The first Academic All-America team in women's basketball is selected.

1982-83 • Academic All-America teams added for volleyball and at-large; All-District teams selected for the first time

1983-84 • Two at-large positions are established on the board. The first two elected to these positions are Debbie Harmison, Old Dominion, and Bennie Thomas, Southern University.

1984-85 • Warren Berg Award is established and presented to the College Division representative who distinguishes himself/herself in the field of sports information. This same year the membership reaches 1,300 when Ernie A. McCarthy, Georgetown Sports Information Director, and his staff are enrolled.

1985 • GTE becomes CoSIDA's first major, on-going corporate partner for the Academic All-America program

1986 • Dick Enberg named spokesperson for GTE Academic All-America program

1986 • Academic All-America becomes a registered trademark of CoSIDA

1987-88 • College Division representatives are now elected by regions - East, South, Central and West.

1987-88 • CoSIDA begins to select an Academic All-America of the Year in each sport and an overall Academic All-America of the Year

1988 • The Academic All-America Hall of Fame was established, with the first class consisting of Bill Bradley, Pete Dawkins, Pat Haden, Tom McMillen, Donn Moomaw and Merlin Olsen.

1990-91 • June Stewart of Vanderbilt becomes the first female president of CoSIDA.

1993 • The Academic All-America Hall of Fame trademark was granted in 1993.

1993-94 • President Ed Carpenter and Kodak establish the "Good Person Award" presented annually to the individual in the profession for humanitarian and civic accomplishments.

1994-95 • Two more at-large positions are added to the board. The board now consists of four at-large members and four college division representatives.

1995-96 • The At-Large program was split into two segments, Fall/Winter and Spring.

2000 • Verizon becomes entitlement rights holder for the Academic All-America program.

2001-02 • Men's track/cross country, women's track/cross country, men's soccer and women's soccer are spun off of the at-large program, increasing the number of Academic All-Americans selected annually from 684 to 815.

2001-02 • Fred Nuesch retires at the end of the year after 23 years as CoSIDA Secretary.

2001-02 • Ed Carpenter hired as CoSIDA's Marketing Director and Maxey Parrish hired as Director of On-Line Services..

2002-03 • Jeff Hodges of North Alabama takes over the role as CoSIDA Secretary.

2004 • ESPN becomes entitlement rights holder for the Academic All-America program.

2004-05 • Two at-large positions are added to the board for College Division At-Large Representatives.

2005-06 • CoSIDA Board adds Rising Star Award to honor up and coming sports information personnel who have been in the profession 10 years or less. The award is added as a permanent CoSIDA Award by vote at the Nashville Workshop.
• CoSIDA Membership tops 2,000 for the first time with 2,192 members for 2005-06.

2005-06 • The nominating and voting process for Academic All-America were moved online

2005-06 • The NCAA Hall of Champions in Indianapolis provides a permanent home for the CoSIDA Hall of Fame. The Hall of Fame plaques are unveiled at the Nashville convention. Nick Vista and Bob Paul are introduced and officially unveil the plaques at an awards dinner at the convention. The plaques are then put on permanent display in August of 2006.

2005-06 • Joe Hernandez of Ball State becomes the first Hispanic to hold the office of President of CoSIDA.

2006-07 • CoSIDA celebrates 50th Anniversary at San Diego Convention.

2006-07 • CoSIDA set new membership record again with 2,216 members.

2007-08 • CoSIDA's post graduate scholarship program is officially named in honor of Fred Nuesch and Dave Wohlhueter, two long time members of the CoSIDA board.

2007-08 • Jamie Joss becomes Director of On-Line Services, following Maxey Parrish's six years in the position.

2008-09 • John Humenik becomes CoSIDA's first fulltime employee when he is hired as the organization's Executive Director.

December 11, 2008 • The CoSIDA Board of Directors voted to accept a hybrid relationship offer from NACDA. With an established five-year Convention schedule set for CoSIDA through 2012 in St. Louis, the Convention partnership will begin in 2013 in Orlando.

2009-10 • Barb Kowal hired as CoSIDA's Director of External Affairs

2009-10 • The NCAA Hall of Champions in Indianapolis provides a permanent home for the Capital One CoSIDA Academic All America Hall of Fame. These plaques are unveiled at the San Francisco convention, and are put on permanent display in August of 2010.

2010-11 • CoSIDA Membership tops 2,800

2011 • Capital One becomes entitlement rights holder for the Academic All-America program.

2011-12 • Academic All-America program expands from two national teams programs (University, College Division) to four (NCAA Division I, NCAA Division II, NCAA Division III and College Division, which includes NAIA, Canada and two-year institutions).

2011-12 • Will Roleson hired as CoSIDA's Director of Internal Operations.

2012-13 • Two females serve in the officer's rotation for the first time - Shelly Poe of Auburn (First Vice President) and Judy Willson of the Mountain West Conference (Third Vice President).

2013 • CoSIDA Convention will be held in conjunction with the National Association of Collegiate Directors of Athletics (NACDA) Convention in Orlando, Fla.

2013-14 • John Humenik, CoSIDA's first Executive Director, steps down from his position.

2013-14 • Shelly Poe of Auburn becomes the third female president of CoSIDA.

2013-14 • Doug Vance hired as CoSIDA's second Executive Director.

2014-15 • Constitution changed to include just immediate Past President as part of the active Board.

2014-15 • Eric McDowell of Union (N.Y.) becomes first CoSIDA President from an NCAA Division III institution (Division I hockey).

2014-15 • Laurie Bollig is hired to fill newly created position of Director of Membership Engagement.

2014-15 • Achievement Awards to deserving members with more than 10 years of service as an assistant are added.

2015-16 • Judy Willson becomes the fourth female president of CoSIDA.

2017 • Will Roleson's title changed to Associate Executive Director

2017 • Barb Kowal's title changed to Director of Professional Development & External Affairs

2017 • Beau White hired as Director of Creative Services

2018-19 • Rob Knox of Towson becomes the second African-American to serve as President of CoSIDA, joining Bob Smith of Rutgers

2019 • Jessica Poole of Florida Atlantic becomes the first African-American female to serve as an officer of CoSIDA.

2019-20 • Jessica Poole of Florida Atlantic is third vice president and Rob Knox is Past President, marking the first time that two African-Americans have served as CoSIDA Officers together.

2019-20 • CoSIDA set a new membership record at 3,225. It marked the seventh straight year with more than 3,000 members.

2020-21 • Sam Atkinson of Gallaudet becomes just the second CoSIDA President from an NCAA Division III institution and the first from a school that only competes in Division III sports.

2020-21 • Mary Beth Challoner of Toronto becomes just the second CoSIDA Board member from a Canadian school.

2020-21 • Mike Robles of the California Community College Athletic Association becomes just the third CoSIDA Board member representing two-year colleges.

June 19, 2020 • A governance revision passes by a 95 percent vote, creating an Executive Board of Directors, Advisory Council and Divisional Cabinets.

June 10, 2021 • For the first time in the history of the organization, one out-going President from a College Division school passed the gavel to an incoming President, also from the College Division. Sam Atkinson from Gallaudet passed the gavel to Cindy Potter from Columbia College.

2021-22 • Cindy Potter from Columbia College became the first-ever NAIA member to serve as CoSIDA President, as well as the first ever female not from an NCAA Division I institution to serve in the organization's highest office.

May 17, 2022 • Erik Christianson, a nationally recognized and award-winning strategic communications leader who has served in senior leadership positions at the NCAA since 2004, was named executive director of the College Sports Information Directors of America (CoSIDA).

Christianson assumed his CoSIDA executive director duties on June 13. He succeeded Doug Vance, who in October announced his retirement from the leadership position, effective July 2022. Vance will stay on with CoSIDA through July to complete his eight-plus years of service as executive director.

Christianson became the third executive director of the organization.

2022-23 • Cindy Potter of Columbia College passed the presidential gavel to Jessica Poole of Chicago State, marking the first time that the organization had back-to-back female presidents. Poole became the first African-American female to lead the organization.

2022-23 • In an effort to provide greater advocacy and support for all communications and creative professionals, the CoSIDA Executive Board of Directors approved a new "All-In" membership model for 2022-23. Beginning in August 2022, institutions will be able to include an unlimited number of members in their CoSIDA memberships for one institutional rate.

2022-23 • Membership in the organization topped 4,000 for the first time in history.

September 1, 2022 • The College Sports Information Directors of America (CoSIDA) today announced it has changed its name to College Sports Communicators. The announcement comes after an Aug. 31 membership-wide vote on the name change, which was passed by the constitutionally-required margin of 60 percent in online/electronic voting. The name, College Sports Communicators, had been unanimously recommended by the Executive Board of Directors following an intensive branding study.

The name change is a major step in a larger strategic plan to highlight the association's evolution and expansion. This move better aligns with its membership makeup and further positions the organization to support and advocate for its members who serve in the communications, digital and creative college sports industry, regardless of position or title.

• 2023-24 marks the 67th year of the existence of the College Sports Communicators, originally incorporated as the College Sports Information Directors of America (CoSIDA) in 1957.

182 • The 203 all-time members of the CoSIDA Board of Directors have represented 182 different schools or conferences.

84 • Individuals have served in the CoSIDA Officer's Rotation.

89 • Individuals have served as College Division Representatives.

11 • There have been 11 individuals who have served ten years or more on the CoSIDA Board of Directors. Of that number, former Treasurer Dave Wohlhueter served a decade longer than any other board member. His 37 years of service to the organization ended at the 2012 St. Louis Convention

7 • There have been seven individuals elected to the CoSIDA Officer's Rotation while at a College Division institution.

7 • There have been seven females elected to the Officer's Rotation.

6 • The CoSIDA Board had a record-tying six female members in 2020-21.

CoSIDA's Presidency by the numbers

• In the 65 years since CoSIDA's Incorporation in 1957, the organization has had 67 Presidents. Martin Reisch and John Cox split the role in 1960-61 and Val Pinchbeck, Jr. and Bob Culp split the 1965-66 year.

• Rob Knox was the second African-American to serve as President of CoSIDA in 2018-19 - with Bob Smith of Rutgers as the first in 1987-88.

• Cindy Potter in 2021-22 is the fifth female to serve as President of CoSIDA and is the first female from a College Division School. She is also the first President and first female President from an NAIA school. Judy Willson in 2015-16 was the fourth female to serve as President of CoSIDA - and the first that was not from the Southeastern Conference. The three previous were June Stewart of Vanderbilt in 1990-91, Tammy Bocclair of Vanderbilt in 2003-04 and Shelly Poe of Auburn in 2013-14. Cindy Potter will become the fifth when she becomes president in 2021-22 and Jessica Poole will become the sixth in 2022-23. It will mark the first time that females will have served as CoSIDA President in back-to-back years.

Points of Significance for 2023-24

• There has been at least one female member of the CoSIDA Board every year since 1981-82 (40 straight years). There are currently five female elected members of the Board.

• There has been at least one African-American member of the CoSIDA Board every year since 1983-84 (40 straight years).

* Second Vice President Mary Beth Challoner is the first person in the officer rotation from a Canadian school.

Diversity on the CSC Board

College Division in Officer's Rotation

- There have been eight individuals elected to the CSC Officer's Rotation while at a College Division institution. Of those, six have served as President of CSC while still at a College Division school: Warren Berg (1963-64), Langston Rogers (1980-81), Tom DiCamillo (2011-12), Eric McDowell (2014-15), Sam Atkinson (2020-21) and Cindy Potter (2021-22). Bob Peterson was elected to the Officer Rotation in 1974-75 while at St. Cloud State University but moved to the University of Minnesota in 1976-77 during his year as First Vice President and also served his Presidential year at Minnesota.

- 2011-12 marked the first time in the history of the CSC Board that there were two College Division representatives in the Officer's Rotation at the same time. (Di Camillo and McDowell). From 2018-21, College Division members Sam Atkinson and Cindy Potter served together in the officer's rotation.

- * 2021 marked the first time that CSC's presidential gavel passed from one College Division President to another when Sam Atkinson of Gallaudet passed it to Cindy Potter of Columbia College.

Diversity on the CSC Board

Females

- There have been 29 females who have served on the CSC Board of Directors. Of those, five (Tammy Bocclair, Shelly Poe, Judy Willson, Cindy Potter, Jessica Poole) were elected to two different terms - first as At-Large Representatives and then to the Officer's Rotation.
- There has been at least one female member of the CoSIDA Board every year since 1981-82 (42 straight years) and there have been at least two female members of the Board every year since 1999-00.
- The most female members to serve on the Board at one time is six in 2018-19, 2019-20 & 2020-21.
- There have been eight females elected to the Officer's Rotation.
- * The first female elected to the CSC Board and also to the Officer's Rotation was Rosa Gatti of Brown in 1979-80. She resigned from the Board the following year to accept a job at ESPN.
- June Stewart became the first female to serve as President of CSC in 1990-91.
- April Emory of Elizabeth City State was the first African-American female elected to the CSC Board in 2005-06.
- Cindy Potter of Columbia (Mo.) College is the first female from an NAIA school to serve on the CSC Board. She is also the first person from the NAIA to be elected to the CSC officer's rotation.
- * 2012-13 marked the first time in the organization's history that two females were serving in the Officer's Rotation at the same time (Shelly Poe and Judy Willson). Cindy Potter and Jessica Poole also served in the officer's rotation together in 2019-20, 2020-21, 2021-22 and 2022-23.
- * As President in 2021-22, Cindy Potter was the sixth female CSC President and the first from a College Division school and first from an NAIA institution.
- * In 2022-23, Mary Beth Challoner of Toronto became the first female from a Canadian institution to join the officer's rotation. She, Poole and Potter made up half of the CSC officer's group.
