# MEMBERS IN THE NEWS

**Dr. Steve Chan**, a pediatric dentist in Fremont, was awarded fellowship in the American College of Dentists at their annual meeting in Boston.

Chan is a past president of the Southern Alameda County Dental Society, vice chairman of the California Dental Association's Council on Dental Health, and chairman of the Professional Outreach Programs for the California Society of Pediatric Dentists.

# CLINICIAN'S CORNER

We hold a place very near and dear to many of our patient's parents. All of our specialized training; our innovatively designed offices; and our special ability to provide just the right amount of TLC help to enhance our speciality in the eyes of these parents.

In the past few years there has been a surge of new restorative materials and techniques which have allowed us to provide invisible fillings, fix fractured teeth without crowns... and the list goes on.

Prema, the enamel microabrasion paste, is one of these new, innovative products (from Premier). It is promoted as a way to remove superficial discolorations; "More conservative than veneers. More effective than bleaches."

The technique uses a 10:1 gear reduction slow speed. The active ingredient is a combination of 18% hydrochloric acid and laboratory pumice which is *slowly* and carefully compressed against enamel. The positive aspect of this technique is that the surface topography of the enamel remains unchanged. This, in contrast to the alterations that take place if burs are used on enamel. While the technique does leave a highly polished, "lustrous" surface, there are drawbacks that need to be addressed.

Firstly, the technique must be done slowly. This avoids the potential splatter of the acidic pumice. It will also prevent excess removal of enamel — in the form of smooth indentations. Secondly, the technique is time consuming, with results coming slowly. Don't be impatient. Finally, and most critically — the technique does not guarantee *all* spot or discoloration removal. The key word in the disclaimer is *superficial*. I strongly recommend a disclaimer for this technique and will be happy to provide a copy of the one we use in our office.

A review of the types of teeth best suited for this technique does not fall within the parameters of this article, but is best reviewed in a slide or photo presentation. I have noticed both UCLA and USC offering esthetic restoration courses which include the microabrasion technique.

As a closing comment — remember my last article on the use of photography to promote your practice? Here's a perfect time to use that new camera system you ran out to buy.

## Board of Director's Meeting January 26, 1991

The CSPD board of directors met at the LAX Airport Hyatt with Drs. Barber Blain, Sobel, McCartney, Reggiardo, Chan, Grossman, Walker, Wolkstein, Berson, and Peder-son present. Many very topical issues were discussed and will be reported on in this bulletin and with future correspondences. Some of these issues are Chloral Hydrate, 60 Minutes — Mercury issue, Medical Lawsuit against the state of California, and new SBE prophylaxis guidelines. Drs. Hansen and Heigeson were approved for Life Membership in CSPD — Congratulations! Congratulations also to Weyland Lum our new District VI representative to AAPD. The slate of officers for the next year was presented and will be voted on at the annual meeting. Certain By-Laws changes were proposed and will also be voted on at the annual meeting. The following four motions were voted on and passed:

1. Dr. S. Blain continue the CSPD input to Legal Services regarding the Denti-Cal access to care issues; and that he write a letter supporting CSPD's position regarding the reform of this program.
2. A second level sponsorship for the 1991 annual meeting be available to those companies not able to attend in Hawaii. This would include 4 bulletin ads and notation in the directory.
3. CSPD send ADA or AAPD amalgam position letter to all California Pediatricians with an explanatory cover letter.

# NEW HEART ASSOCIATION RECOMMENDATIONS

The prophylactic antibiotic regimen for dental, oral and upper respiratory tract procedures was published in the December issue of *The Journal of the American Medical Association* (Vol. 264, no. 22, pp. 2919-22). The Council on Dental Therapeutics of the American Dental Association has approved the statement as it relates to dentistry.

Dosage for Adults		Dosage for Children*
<b>Standard Regimen (Oral)<sup>1</sup></b>

<sup>1</sup>For patients with prosthetic heart valves, previous endocarditis, most congenital cardiac malformations (but not isolated secundum atrial septal defect), rheumatic and other acquired valvular dysfunction, hypertrophic cardiomyopathy, and mitral valve prolapse with valvular regurgitation.

<sup>2</sup>Oral regimen may be substituted for second parenteral dose if patient can tolerate medication.

<sup>3</sup>May be used in place of standard regimen at discretion of practitioner.

## SCHOOL EXCUSES

Recent communication between the Board and the California State Department of Education has led to the following statement regarding student absences for the purpose of dental office visits.

Subsection (b) states that the absence of a pupil from school or class for purposes of having medical, dental, optometrical, or chiropractic appointments, shall not be deemed absent when the school is computing attendance.

## RESEARCH WORKSHOP/TMJ SYMPOSIUM REVIEW

Recognizing the vast potential for conducting clinical research within our specialty, the A.A.P.D. Research Committee has held a research workshop at each of the last two Annual Sessions with the purpose of involving practitioners in clinical research projects under the guidance of the Research Committee. In 1989 the workshop discussed such topics as private practice as a forum for clinical research, experimental design, data evaluation and publication protocols. Last year, the central theme of the workshop was the use of human (pediatric) subjects in clinical research.

This year's workshop will take the process one step further and launch a research project. We plan to conduct a study that will investigate the prevalence of TMJ signs and symptoms in pediatric dental patients. We believe that the Annual Session in San Antonio will be the ideal forum for launching such a project particularly since a review of the recent conference on TMJ will also be presented. The workshop will immediately follow this review.

Precise details as to the nature of the proposed study have yet to be finalized. However, it will involve the collection of data from a consecutive series of patients seen within a private practice over a defined, one week period. Data collection will be in the form of a questionnaire that is expected to take approximately two minutes to complete, keeping disruption of normal daily routines to a minimum. Final details will be presented during the workshop at the Annual Session.

The success of this project and the anticipated development of others like it depends in large part on the interest of the membership at large. Private practices where this project is to be performed will be recruited on a volunteer basis. Those individuals who are interested in participating are encouraged to contact Mrs. Bridget Finner in the Headquarters Office for further details.

## DENTI-CAL UPDATE

The Federal District Court, Eastern District of California, has granted partial summary judgment on the Denti-Cal case filed by the Legal Services of Northern California on behalf of Virginia Clark et al. against Kenneth Kizer, M.D.

As background, Judge Karlton has found the State of California is not in compliance with the EQUAL ACCESS requirement of the federal law and federal regulations. The regulation requires a two-thirds participation ratio. Less than 40% of the licensed dentists in the state treat Denti-Cal recipients which is substantially below the two-thirds participation requirement. In addition, the majority of participation providers are not full participants with only 12.5% of active dentists accepting new patients.

Reimbursement was a second factor that the Judge identified to address the equal access requirement. It was determined that Denti-Cal dentists are reimbursed approximately 40% of their usual rate and that this was "wholly inadequate" and thus providers are opting out of the program for valid reasons. The program has failed to increase in accordance with the Dental Consumer Price Index and a 50% increase would be needed in reimbursement rates just to meet the Denti-Cal provider's overhead.

Lastly, the Judge noted that the equal access problem may be reflected by the 32% utilization rate of Denti-Cal recipients versus the 67% utilization rate for the insured population. It was interesting to note that the Judge used the CSPD declaration specifically to determine that "it is undisputed that the major concern with the Denti-Cal program on the part of dentists is the low reimbursement level".

The Judge did not rule as to whether Denti-Cal recipients would be denied free choice if the free choice is to be among those dentists who choose to participate in the program versus any dentists.

Lastly, the State was found to have a Denti-Cal program that is not functioning on a statewide basis and this out of compliance with the statewide availability provision; the State did not dispute the fact that Denti-Cal recipients frequently experience delays in obtaining regular and emergency appointments and the State admits that the availability of services varies from county to county.

The State of California has submitted a proposal in response to the summary judgments. Various CSPD members have reviewed the proposal and the CSPD recommendations have been forwarded to Legal Services as they begin to challenge the State's proposal.

## PEER REVIEW ACTIVITY 1990

Fourteen cases were referred to CSPD Speciality Review in 1990. Seven of these cases were resolved in favor of the patient and three were resolved in favor of the dentist. Of the remaining cases, two were resolved by the dentist prior to review; one was rejected because it exceeded time limitation for filing; the last case was deemed unresolvable by the peer review process and no resolution was made.

Seven cases involved quality of orthodontic care and one case involved appropriateness of orthodontic diagnosis and treatment planning; four cases involved quality of restorative dental treatment; one case involved failure to diagnose; one case involved appropriateness of diagnosis and treatment planning recommendations for restorative and preventive dental procedures.

Paul Reggiardo, CSPD Peer Review Chairman, once again emphasized the small number of cases received as a compliment to the good communication and treatment provided by member Pediatric Dentists in California. 
