# SERVICE LEADERSHIP

#### **Essential Question:**

How can I be an agent for positive change in the community?

#### Measurable Outcomes:

- Increased awareness of your own strengths and areas for growth
- Demonstrating perseverance and commitment in activities
- Planning and initiating activities

## Intro Activity: Students answer self-review questions

### **Education:** Teacher leads/instructs about service and leadership

What is Servant Leadership? It is a philosophy and set of practices that enriches the lives of individuals, builds better organizations, and ultimately creates a more just and caring world (e.g. – Jesus, Ghandi, M.L.K. Jr., Mother Teresa; also business leaders, civic leaders, sports figures, community members. For example, in Pensacola, businessman Quint Studer. "\_\_\_\_\_\_" - ask for students to give the names of local, state, or regional individuals who serve and contribute in this way)

Exposure: Provide opportunities for students to interact with Servant Leaders in the community by using available online resources or conducting site visits, or bringing in guest speakers.

### **Project Development:**

This project will include a number of different aspects of leadership, including but not limited to: time management, teamwork, creativity, long-term commitment, adaptability, and communication skills. The goal of the project is to provide students with a tangible experience supported by evidence which encourages them to make connections between the themes they will use in the classroom and the application of those themes in the real world. This project will give students an opportunity to showcase the knowledge they have gained and skills they have acquired as a result of the leadership curriculum. This may be completed as individuals or groups.
