


# Nonprofits <u>cannot</u> make up the difference if SNAP and Medicaid cuts are passed

Nonprofits do incredible work, often stepping up in times of crisis—but even we have limits. A \$715 billion funding cut is beyond what any nonprofit system can absorb.



### SNAP cuts impact millions

- SNAP provides basic food assistance for more than 40 million people, including some 16 million children, 8 million seniors, and 4 million non-elderly adults with disabilities.
- The House reconciliation bill would cut SNAP by nearly \$300 billion through 2034. States would need to cover the difference to keep the same coverage.

## Public opinion on SNAP

• "The **US public broadly supports** increasing or maintaining spending on SNAP."

### Medicaid cuts impact millions

- Roughly 15 million people by 2034 would lose health coverage and become uninsured because of the Medicaid cuts.
- Medicaid cuts would impact veterans, children, older adults, those who live in rural areas, urban and suburban areas, people with disabilities, those who work. Medicaid cuts would impact people in every community.

## Public opinion on Medicaid

• **Medicaid is popular** as it holds favorable views in public. Most want Medicaid spending increased or to stay the same, few want to see it cut.
