
HOT SPOTS



What is it?

Pyotraumatic moist dermatitis, or "hot spot", is a local and typically superficial skin infection. Hot spots are most common in double-coated dogs due to moisture trapping against the skin. This creates a warm, moist environment for bacteria to thrive and proliferate. Swimming is a seasonal risk factor, but so are allergies.

What should pet owners do?

If you suspect a hot spot, avoid over-thecounter treatments. Ointments trap moisture and bacteria, and hydrogen peroxide can damage healing tissue. Use an Elizabethan collar to prevent irritation and consult your vet.

Why do we worry?

Hot spots are incredibly uncomfortable for the pet, causing pain and itch. A pet's own self-trauma (over-grooming, scratching) can cause the infection, inoculating bacteria. Continuous self-trauma will extend the affected area and lead to more devastating infection, such as necrotizing fasciitis.

Veterinary Care

Effective hot spot treatment includes clipping hair to reduce moisture, which may require sedation, and thoroughly cleaning the area—ideally after collecting a culture if needed.

Treatment typically involves topical and systemic antibiotics, strict use of an Elizabethan collar, and allergy meds if appropriate.
