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Deployment Health Defined



Deployment health is defined as health issues that arise prior to, during, and following armed forces deployments.

Servicewomen's Expanding Roles



- Women have carried arms & been at risk in every US war since the American revolution.
- Women's recent unrestricted service:
 - Repeal of the military ban on women in combat (2013)
 - All US military combat positions open to women (2015)

Women Essential to Military Readiness



Concerns about the adverse impact of expanded roles for women have **NOT** been realized regarding:

- military readiness
- unit cohesion
- military effectiveness in war

Military Women and Deployment






- Women 11% of Iraq/Afghanistan (I/A) service members.
- ~300,000 women have served in I/A in last decade.
- † racial mix- relative to men (45% nonwhite vs 28%).
- Female and Reserve/National Guard(RNG) among fastest growing Veteran populations.
- RNG have unique stressors and
 † rates of mental health concerns.

Iraq/Afghanistan Veterans' Experiences






Notes: A total of 262 of 336 Iraq and Afghanistan veterans volunteered 304 words. Veterans who served in both countries could give a word to describe each experience.



Military Women in Combat Locations



- Women are seeing more combat.
 - Since 1990, ~25% of women report combat experiences relative to 7% of those serving previously.
- Women also at risk of sexual violence.

More Troops Surviving Combat Wounds



Percentage of servicemembers surviving combat injuries continues to increase:

- 90% in Iraq/Afghanistan survive
- 72% in Vietnam survived
- 63% in WWII survived

Mental Health Consequences of War



Women experience complex mental health consequences of deployment(s).

- PTSD the leading mental health condition
- Substance abuse /Binge drinking
- Depression

VA Research of Women in War



Health VIEWS Study:

10,000 Women Who Served in the Vietnam War (VN)

- Women VN era relative to other American women had ↓ risk of death from:
 - All causes combined -
 - Diabetes, Heart disease, Central nervous system
- Nurses who served in VN compared with nurses served only in US
 - 2x risk of death from pancreatic cancer
 - 5x the risk of brain cancer
- <u>Women serving in VN or near VN</u> had ↑odds of PTSD relative to peers in US service associated with wartime exposures
 - including sexual discrimination or harassment
 - job performance pressures



VA Healthcare Access



Returning Servicemembers (OEF/OIF/OND) Have Enhanced Eligibility for VA Health Care:

Veterans who served in a theater of combat operations after November 11, 1998 are eligible for an extended period of eligibility for health care for 5 years post discharge.

Mental Health Care Engagement

Approximately half of OEF/OIF/OND service men and women DO NOT seek needed post-deployment mental health care either in VA or their community.




