2023 Symposium Summary:

Leveraging Technology to Advance Nursing and Equity in Research, Practice, and Education

This year's conference occurred in the majestic Sonoran Desert in Tucson, Arizona. Nurse researchers, and clinicians gathered to ponder the limitless possibilities of technology's transformative power in Nursing.

We gathered at a beautiful resort to exchange ideas, network, and experience the normalcy of being around our peers. However, we would be remiss to not acknowledge the history of these ancestral lands and the current health disparities and inequities in the Tucson community.

The population of Tucson, AZ is 45% Hispanic/ Latino/x (U.S. Census, 2022), which boasts the second highest rates of poverty in the region, behind only the American Indian population of Tucson (Pullen, 2022).

This data reinforces the importance of this year's WIN Conference Theme, "Leveraging Technology to Advance Nursing and Equity in Research, Practice, and Education. "

Our Latino/x SIG nurse researchers did not disappoint by leading the field and spotlighting opportunities to advance Latino Health. The esteemed Dr. Lucero, Ph.D., MPH, RN, FAAN, the Associate Dean of Equity, Diversity, and Inclusion at UCLA led the charge. Dr. Lucero's research focuses on using health systems' technology and informatics to improve the health outcomes of vulnerable populations. Naturally, he was the perfect choice to deliver the Keynote speech on day two of the conference. Dr. Lucero's speech reminded us that "the old becomes new again" through innovation in Nursing, and there is an imperative to advance equity in Nursing education, particularly among Latinos. During our symposium, "Nothing about Us without Us": Contemporary Uses of Technology & Emerging Methods to Advance Latino/x Health Equity, Dr. Martinez-Hollingsworth, and Dr. Loya provided an overview of the status of Latino Health and highlighted the need for innovation and equity in the field. The panelists' fresh take on technology's role in advancing Latino/x Health included Dr. Gularte-Rinaldo's presentation on her pilot program to improve Latino Health Literacy by providing Spanish classes to healthcare students.

Dr. Amura and Dr. Medina presented data on the outcomes in Latino/x communities of their Medication Assisted Treatment Program for Opioid Use, which was extremely interesting and topical. Dr. Alvarez illuminated the audience with existing disparities of childhood stress and depression in Latino/x Nursing students. Lastly, Ms. Caffe guided us through an exploration of Epigenetics and its potential in addressing health issues like metabolic syndrome in Latino/x populations. Our researchers continue to drive the science forward, making strides toward Health Equity for Hispanic and Latino/x Communities.

We closed the conference with a Latino/x Interest Group Breakfast led by Dr. Martinez-Hollingsworth. Members were encouraged to mingle and discuss common topics of interest to further connections and future partnerships. The new WIN SIG website was unveiled, along with the new logo. It was announced that Dr. Loya, Dr. Jaime-Lara, and Dr. Tayyeb would join the board, providing fresh perspectives. The conference ended on a hopeful note and promised new and exciting directions for the WIN Latino/x Special Interest Group.

Dr. Rosario Jaime-Lara, PhD, MSN, RN, UCLA, Co-Chair

Can you tell us a bit about your background?

I was born and raised in Mexico and immigrated to the United States when I was a child. I have lived most of my life in California and left the west coast to pursue a graduate education. I completed my PhD at the University of Pennsylvania and recently completed my postdoctoral training at NIH. I am excited to be back on the west coast and I am very passionate about advancing Latino/x health through research and preparing the next generation of nurses and nurse researchers!

What has been your research focus?

My research has focused on studying nutrition eating behavior in the context of obesity and health.

Why did you join the WIN Latino/x SIG?

I joined the WIN Latino/x SIG to find a community of nurses and researchers interested in promoting health in Latino/x communities.

What do you see as the biggest barrier to representation/ inclusion among Latinos in Nursing Research?



I think one of the biggest barriers to representation/inclusion

among Latinos in Nursing Research is the lack of representation of Latinos/x in higher education. We need to increase diversity among faculty. This is an important step towards making research and academia more diverse and inclusive. Moving through the educational pipeline and learning to navigate the complexities of nursing school is difficult. We need a more diverse faculty to increase visibility, mentor, educate and support future nurse researchers.

What do you hope to accomplish as a Latino/x SIG Co-Chair?

I hope to increase engagement of our members and grow collaborations that support the growth of our Latino/x SIG familia.

Dr. Julio Loya, PhD, MSN, RN, University of Arizona, Co-Chair

Can you tell us a bit about your background?

I was originally born in Nogales, Sonora, Mexico, but I have been living in Tucson, Arizona for the majority of my life and consider Tucson my hometown. I did not know I wanted to be a nurse until after I earned a bachelor's degree in general biology. After graduating from the University of Arizona, I earned an associate in applied science in nursing degree from Cochise College. After a few years of clinical practice, I earned a bachelor of science in nursing degree from Northern Arizona University. At this point, I was working full time as a manager of a step down trauma unit. I went to graduate school originally to earn a graduate degree in nursing leadership. However, after taking the theory and research courses, I was hooked. That's when I switched from the master's program to enroll in the PhD program at the University of Missouri – Columbia. I earned my PhD in Nursing in the summer of 2021

What is the focus of your clinical practice?

My clinical practice focus includes experience in medical surgical settings as a staff nurse, assistant manager, nurse manager, and associate director. I have over 19 years of experience as a nurse, with 15 of these years of experience in different leadership roles in acute care settings.



What has been your research focus?

My research focuses on finding effective, sustainable biobehavioral interventions to improve the health of Latinx people with type 2 diabetes. I am passionate about health equity/health disparities and addressing these through social determinants of health. As my research focus evolves, I want to develop and test community- and systems-level interventions as I believe these are going to be more impactful to the well-being of the Latinx community.

Why did you join the WIN Latino/x SIG?

I joined the WIN Latino/x SIG because it is a great group that focuses on my population of interest. It is really great to be able to interact and collaborate with like-minded individuals in a supportive forum. As a graduate student, I was aware of WIN, but I was not a member of the organization. Looking back, I wish I would have joined the WIN Latino/x SIG earlier in my journey.

What do you see as the biggest barrier to representation/inclusion among Latinos in Nursing Research?

I think that one of the biggest barriers to representation/inclusion among Latinos in nursing research is being aware that we belong, and we are needed in this arena. In my opinion, one of the endemic attitudes of nursing professionals in general is that we don't do a very good job in acknowledging how valuable and significant our contributions are in our respective areas. We often downplay our attributes and talents as "I'm just doing my job." While it may not be easy or feel like we are being egocentric, we must continue to advocate for our hard work and for our right to be present and counted as decision-makers.

What do you hope to accomplish as a Latino/x SIG Co-Chair?

As a Latino/x SIG Co-Chair, I hope to accomplish a number of things. First, I want to continue fostering the sense of unity and belonging for all members (new and existing) by continuing to promote a sense of community and support. Second, I want to increase our SIG membership ranks by sharing the benefits of joining our SIG. Third, I want to mentor other members to maximize their potential; whether they want to conduct research, move into leadership positions, or provide care, I want to support the current and next generations of nurses in their quest to improve their communities. Lastly, I want to learn how to be a more effective co-chair as I believe this experience will yield significant opportunities for collaborations and relationship-building with the members of the SIG.

Dr. Ali Tayyeb, PhD, RN, NPD-BC, PHN, UCLA

Dr. Tayyeb is a United States Navy Veteran, having served as a Fleet Marine Force Corpsman with Naval Medical Center San Diego, 1st Marine Division, and 3rd Marine Division.

After his military service, Dr. Tayyeb pursued his career as a Registered Nurse, earning his Bachelor's and Master's degree in Nursing from California State University, Los Angeles and his Ph.D. from the University of San Diego. Dr. Tayyeb's experiences in the healthcare field include combat trauma, emergency medicine, education, Human Patient Simulation, Professional Development, Leadership, Veterans Healthcare, and Policy.

Dr. Tayyeb is a Jonas Veterans Healthcare Scholar Alumnus and is the Creator, Producer, and Host of the RN-Mentor Podcast and Blog. He is also the creator of RN-Doodle, DOC's Veterans Corner, & Zero Dark Thirty.



Dr. Tayyeb Currently serves as the Director of Educational Technology & Innovation and holds the rank of Associate Adjunct Professor at the UCLA School of Nursing, where his research, education, and advocacy interests in Veterans related topics include: Transition from military service, Post-Traumatic Stress, Traumatic Brain Injuries, Depression, Alcohol and Drug abuse, Pain, Suicide, Family environment, Disenfranchisement, Policy, Culture, Veteran Benefits & Reintegration.

Though Dr. Tayyeb's research is primarily veteran centric, his work has evolved into the exploration of systemic failures and advancing social networks to connect and advance nursing issues while facilitating nursing discourse centered around the theory of social contracts.

Dr. Tayyeb is also ANCC nationally board certified in Nursing Professional Development and greatly invested in professional development, role development, and pushing the boundaries of the nursing profession through diversity of people, thought, advocacy, and the arts.



The Nurses' Health Study

The Nurses' Health Studies are the largest, longest running investigations of health and wellness in the world. The Nurses' Health Study began in 1976 with over 120,000 female nurses nationwide. Several years later, NHS2 began in 1989 nearly doubling the cohort. In 2010 NHS3 was formed and is currently enrolling participants.

The original focus of NHS was on contraceptive methods, smoking, cancer, and heart disease, but has expanded over time to include research on many other lifestyle factors, behaviors, personal characteristics, occupational and environmental exposures and more than 30 diseases and conditions. Racial and ethnic minorities continue to be underrepresented in medical research; NHS3 aims to represent nurses of diverse backgrounds. Participation has expanded to include nurses and nursing students of any gender living in the US and Canada.

NHS3 is currently enrolling participants to complete 30-minute questionnaires every 6 months. To be eligible for enrollment participants must meet the criteria below. 
